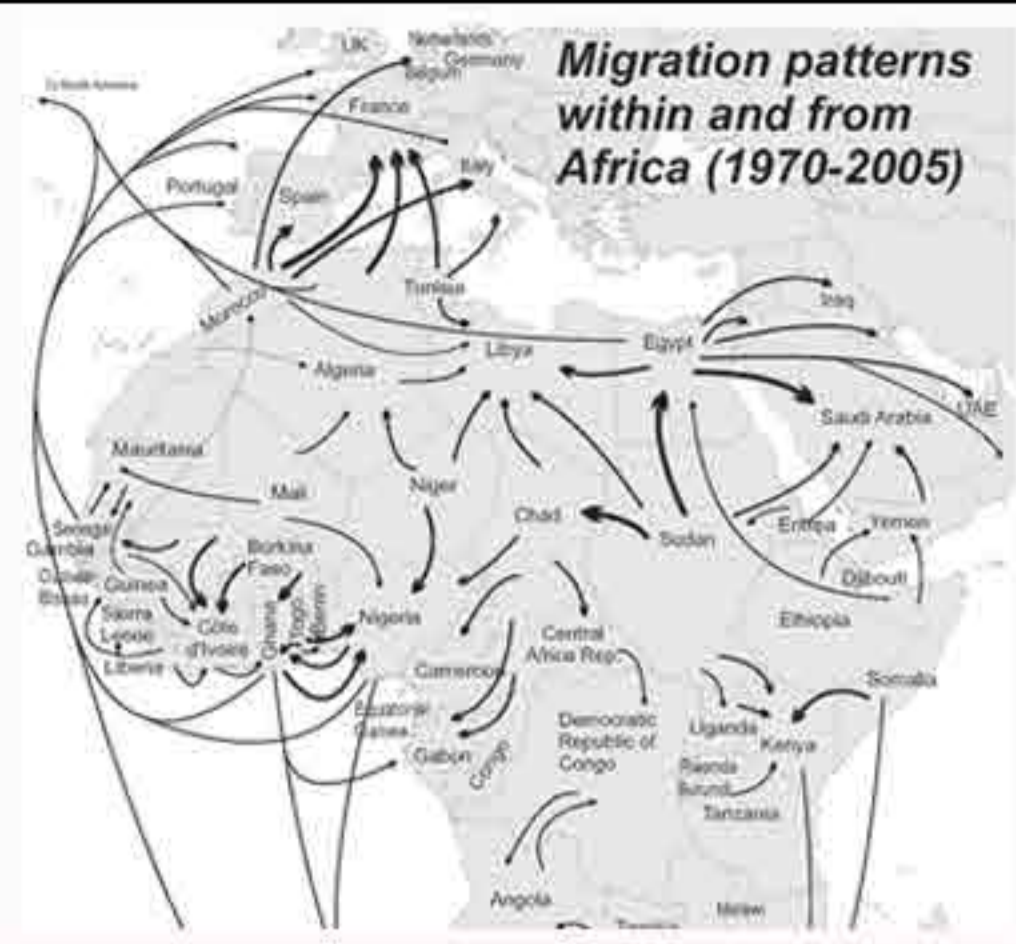




TYPHOON REFUGEE RESCUE SUBMARINE AT THE STRAIT OF GIBRALTAR

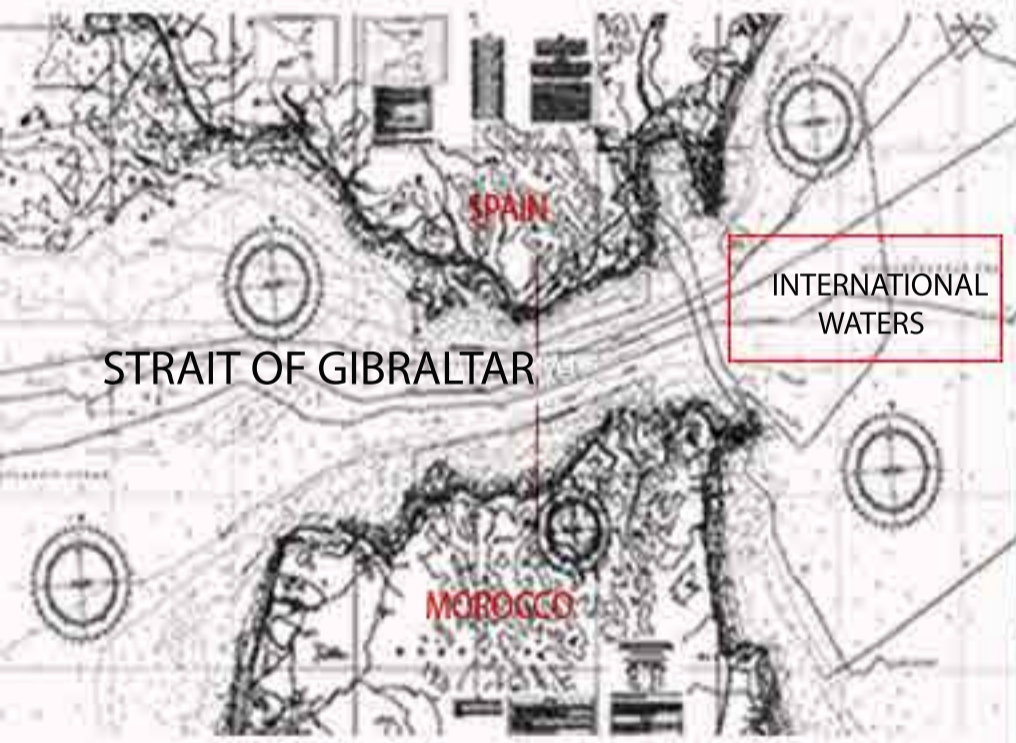


The Strait of Gibraltar is a narrow strait that connects the Atlantic Ocean to the Mediterranean Sea and separates Peninsular Spain in Europe from Morocco in Africa.

The Strait of Gibraltar has become a deathtrap for countless refugees and migrants in a desperate attempt to cross over to Europe and is therefore described again and again as the world's greatest mass grave' or 'the cemetery of the Mediterranean'.

It is roughly estimated that more than a thousand people have up to now been drowned trying to cross in the Straits of Gibraltar in 'pateras' (little fishing boats)

This project proposes transforming a nuclear Typhoon rusian submarine into a floating rescue and refugee camp, with a double function: The rescue of migrants on the strait of Gibraltar and the subsequent transfer of the later to international waters .

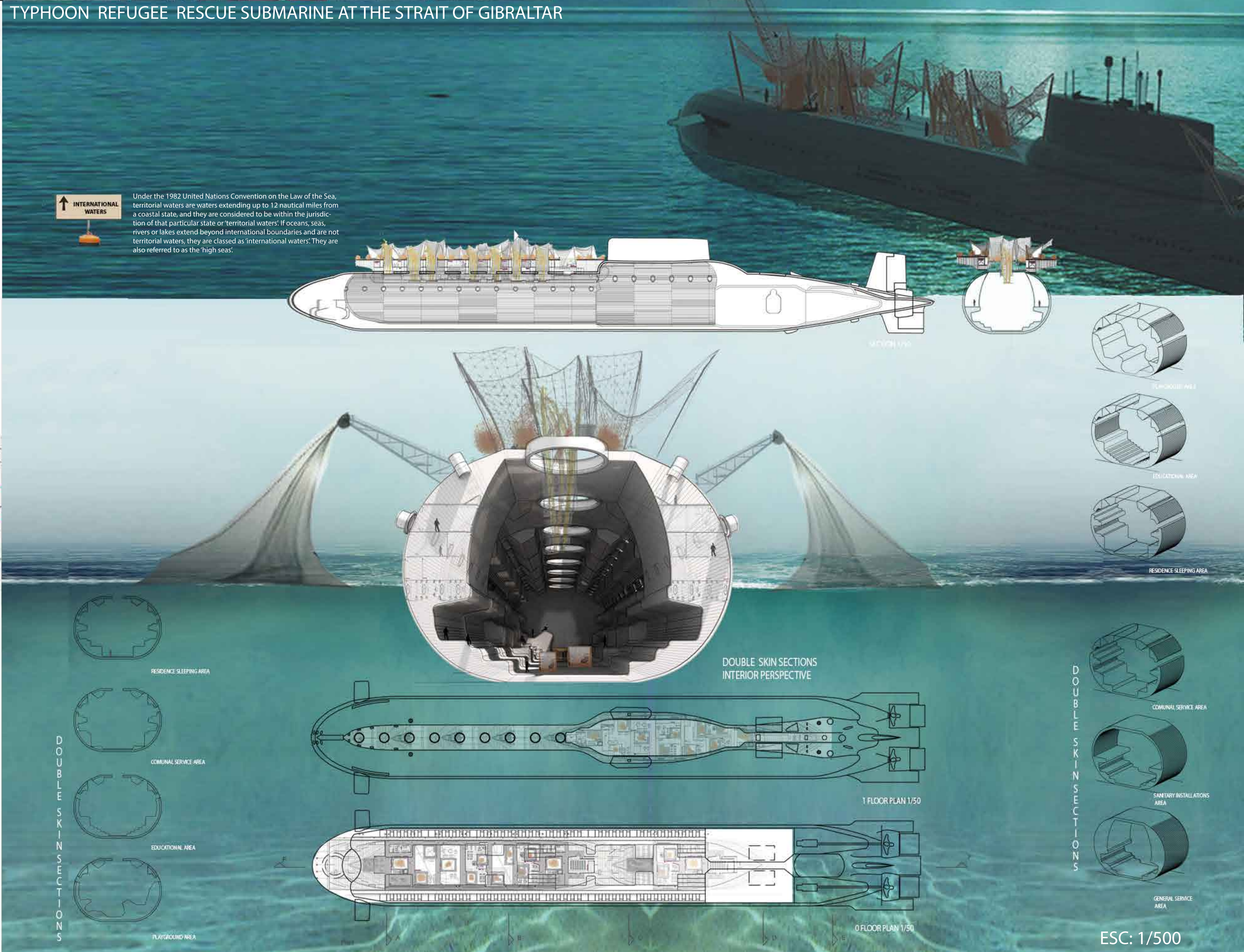


TYPHOON REFUGEE CAMP
 Once in calm international waters and for an indefinite period of time all the necessary instalations (workshops, fish farms, orchards platforms, outdoor shelters ...) will be displayed on the stern of the submarine to insure that the ultimate goal of this project is completed ,the insertion of migrants in the european labour market.

TYPHOON RESCUE SUBMARINE
 The interior of the submarine has been designed with a double structural skin that hosts a complete program of sanitary, educational and shelter instalations to insure all the necessary needs of the refugees who inhabit its interior while on transfer period.

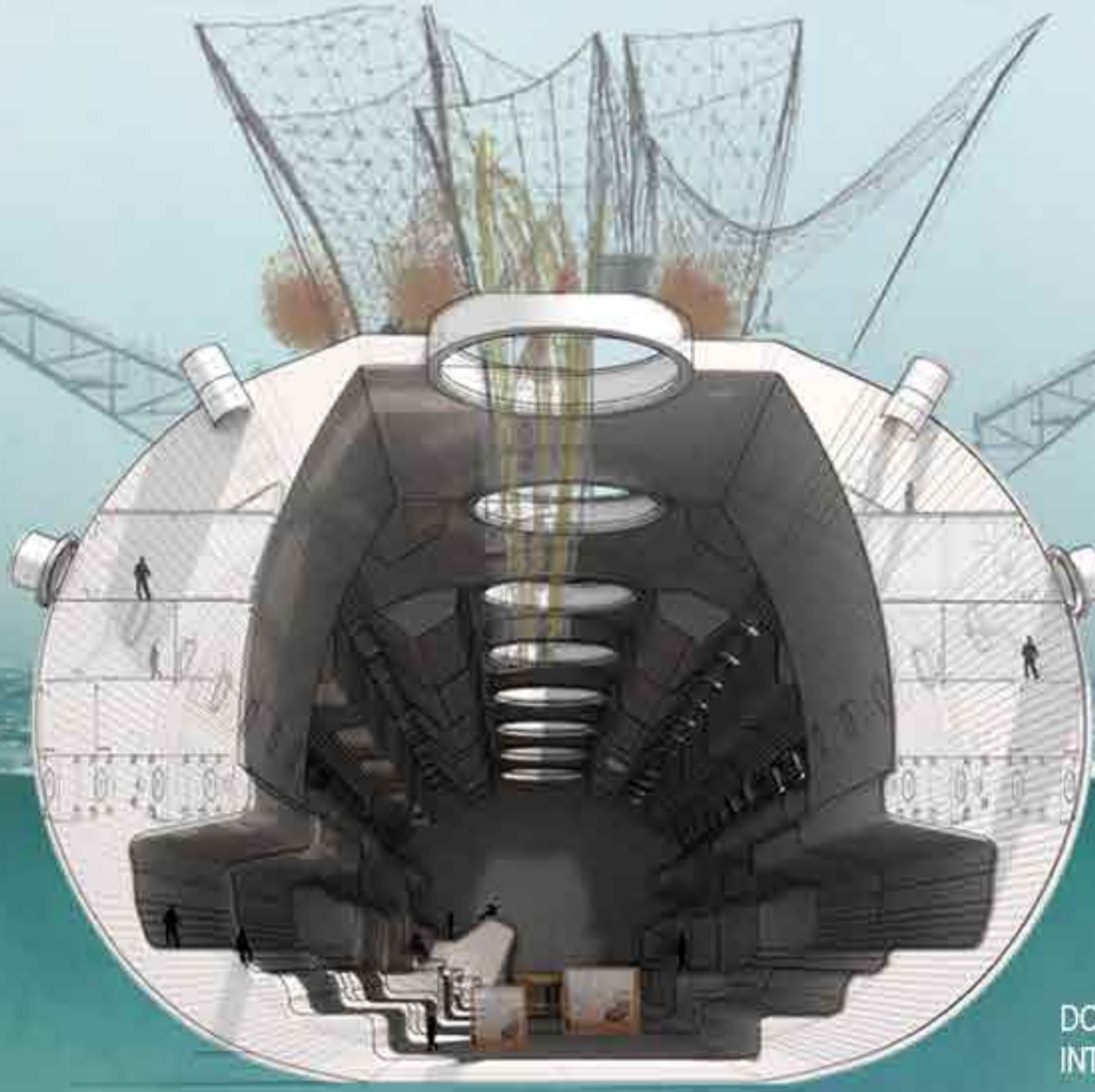
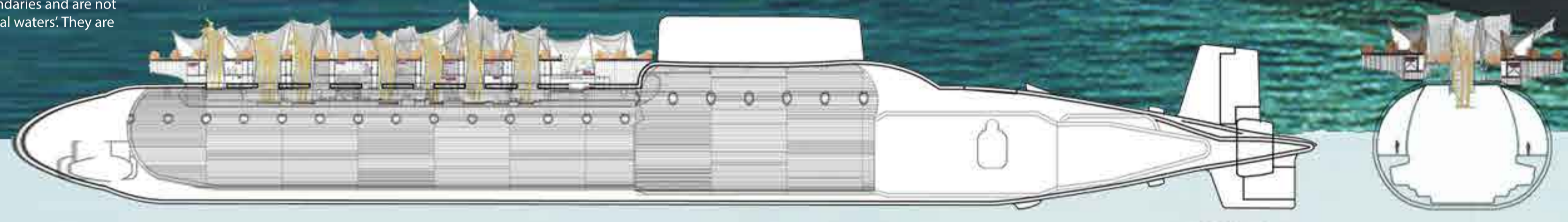
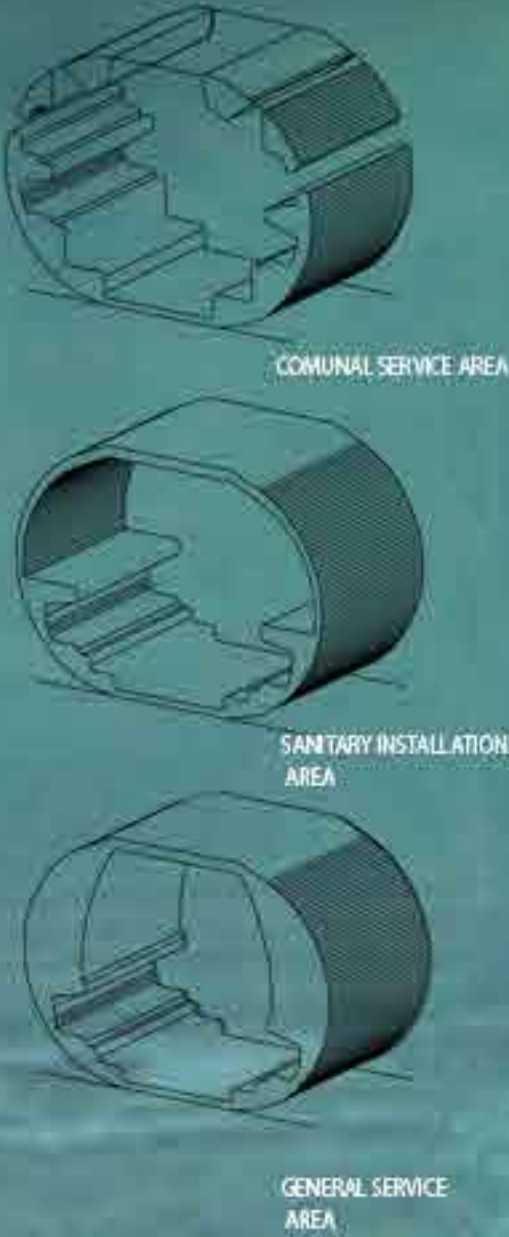
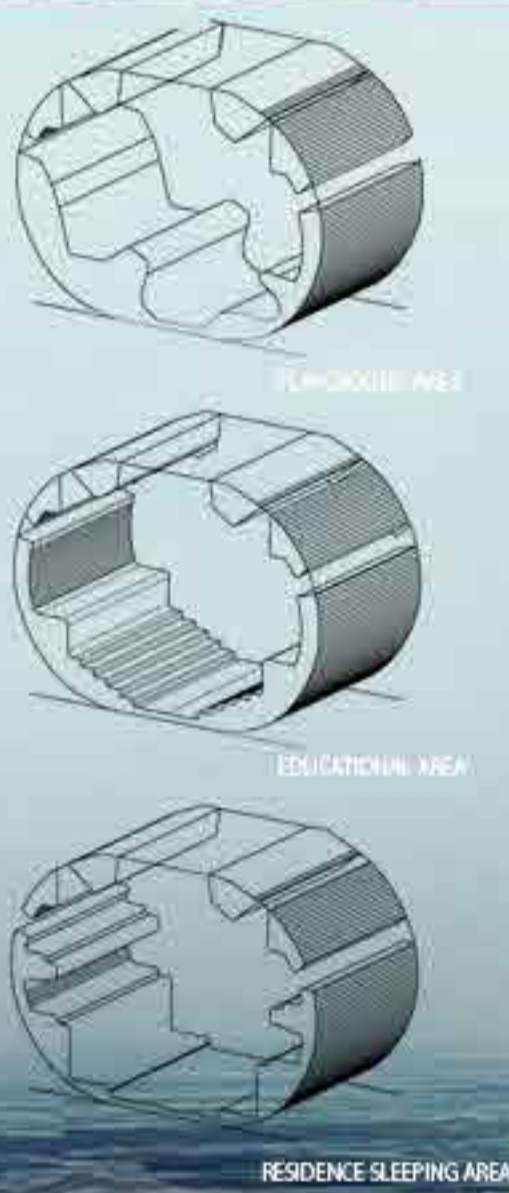
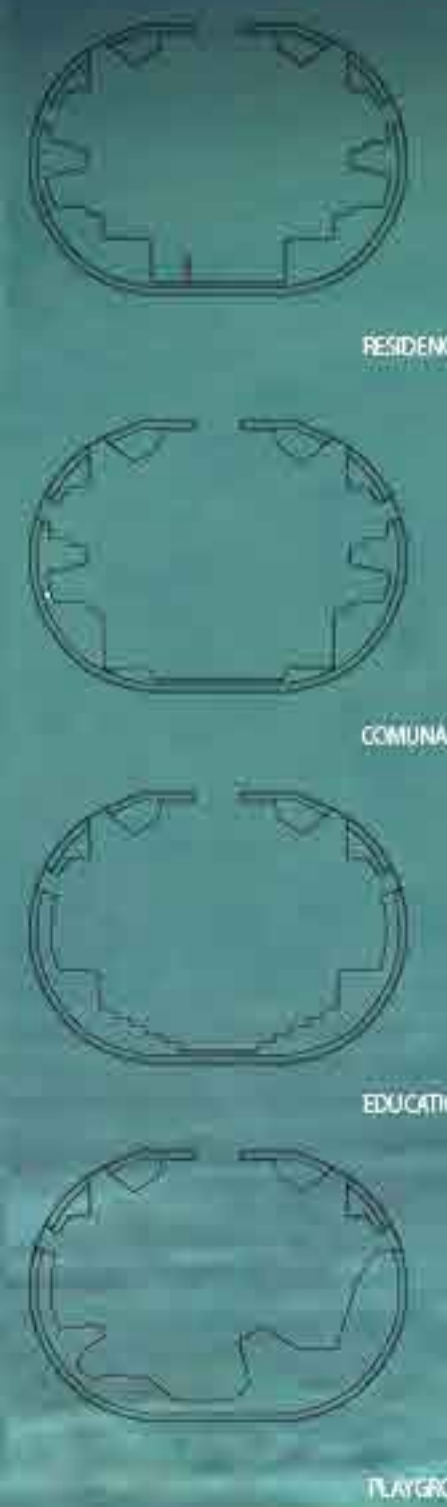


INTERNATIONAL WATERS
 Under the 1982 United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea, territorial waters are waters extending up to 12 nautical miles from a coastal state, and they are considered to be within the jurisdiction of that particular state or 'territorial waters'. If oceans, seas, rivers or lakes extend beyond international boundaries and are not territorial waters, they are classed as 'international waters'. They are also referred to as the 'high seas'.

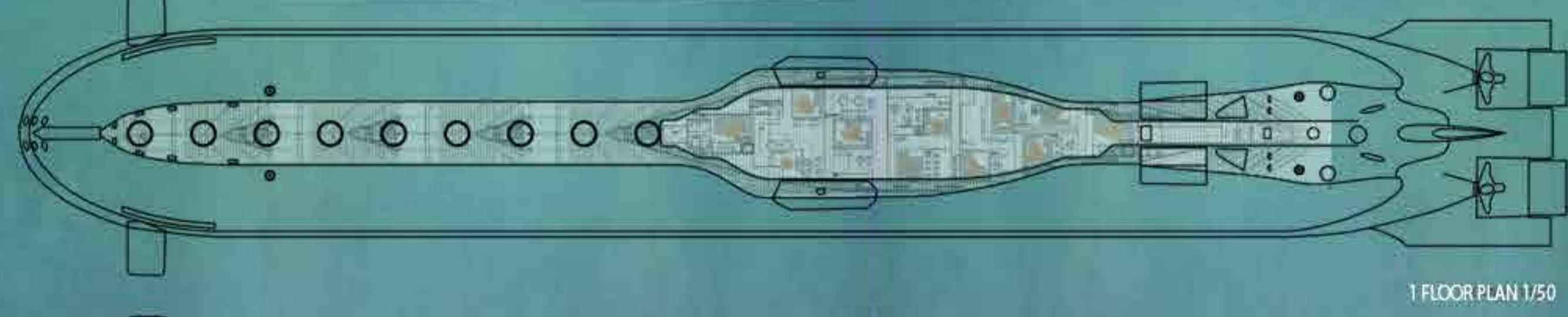


DOUBLE SKIN SECTIONS
